Douglas G. Mortensen

Mr. Mortensen is a civil trial attorney admitted to practice in both Utah and Arizona. An officer and shareholder of Matheson, Mortensen, Olsen & Jeppson, P.C. for the last 24 years, Mr. Mortensen began his career as a law clerk to the Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court following graduation from the University of Utah College of Law in 1977. Mr. Mortensen is past president of the Utah Trial Lawyers Association (2003-2004) and remains a member of that organization's governing board (nka Utah Association for Justice). He has held Martindale Hubbell's highest (A V) rating continuously since 1991. He has been awarded "Legal Elite" status by Utah Business Magazine every year since that magazine began rating Utah lawyers, based on evaluations submitted by other attorneys throughout Utah. Mr. Mortensen has been a member of the Third Judicial District Court Nominating Commission and since 1995 has served on the Utah Supreme Court's Board of Continuing Legal Education.

Mr. Mortensen has tried 72 civil cases and 11 criminal cases to completion and has settled well over 360 cases for injury victims and their survivors. As a member of **Medmarc's panel** of approved defense counsel, he has also defended medical device manufacturers. He has handled **construction**, **trucking**, **loan fraud** and complex **commercial lease cases**, as well as contested **adoptions** and **child custody dispute cases**. Mr. Mortensen has written successful appeal briefs in several cases including: Boice v. Marble, 982 P.2d 565 (Utah 1999); Wilde v. Wilde, 969 P.2d 438 (Utah App. 1998); Olympus Hills Shopping Center v. Landes, 821 P.2d 451 (Utah 1991); Martindale v. Adams, 777 P.2d 514 (Utah App. 1987); See also Haase v. Ashley Valley Medical Center, 2003 WL21664781, 2003 UT App. 260(unpublished Court of Appeals opinion), cert. denied 78 P.3d 987 (2003).

Mr. Mortensen has achieved several noteworthy trial successes including: a \$820,000 jury verdict against a hospital for having negligently credentialed an impaired surgeon whose surgery caused permanent knee damage to a 33 year-old mother and homemaker; a \$720,282 judgment following a jury trial against a company which had failed to meet its duty to supervise a brain-injured man who burned down an apartment complex; and a judicial



declaration in the U.S. District Court of Wyoming of 100% liability against a Utah orthopedic surgeon who had negligently implanted an artificial knee in a 40 year-old Wyoming nurse.

Mr. Mortensen has handled several **legal malpractice** cases and has been retained twice to testify as an expert witness on **attorney negligence issues**.
