KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Prof. Vijay Kumar Bhatia

Professor Vijay Kumar Bhatia is the President of “LSP and Professional Communication Association”-an association of researchers and practitioners specializing in languages for specific purposes and professional communication. As a Professor of Applied Linguistics, Prof. Vijay Kumar Bhatia taught in the Department of English at the City University of Hong Kong. His research interests include applied genre analysis of academic and professional discourse, ESP and Professional Communication (Theory and Practice); simplification of legal and other public documents; cross-cultural and disciplinary variation in professional discourses. He has to his credit more than 150 publications, which include journal articles, books chapters, edited volumes and individually written books. Two of his books '*Analysing Genre: Language Use in Professional Settings*' (Bloomsbury) and '*Worlds of Written Discourse*' (Continuum) are widely used by researchers in discourse and genre theory, and ESP practice. He has given more than 200 presentations in various international conferences, many of which include invited plenary and keynote addresses.

Prof. Maurizio Gotti

Maurizio Gotti is Professor of English Language and Translation, Head of the Department of Foreign Languages, Literatures and Communication, and Director of the Research Centre on Specialized Languages (CERLIS) at the University of Bergamo. His main research areas are the features and origins of specialized discourse. He is also interested in English syntax and English lexicology and lexicography. He is a member of the Editorial Board of national and international journals, and edits the Linguistic Insights series for Peter Lang. He is author and editor of ten books, guest-editor of five journal special issues and has published over one hundred and fifty journal articles and book chapters.

Prof. Charles Hall

Prof. Charles Hall, Ph.D., dr.h.c. is an Associate Professor of English at Alfaisal University in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. His work intertwines three areas of interest: TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language), ESP (English for Specific Purposes) - especially law and business -, and the cultural influence of American English in global media. Prof. Hall regularly conducts seminars and workshops for corporations, universities, government agencies, and NGOs in the United States, Europe, North Africa, South America, and Asia. He has taught or lectured in over 40 countries, including Iraq, Sudan, Yemen, and Syria. He has had two Senior Fulbrights and multiple grants from the U.S. Department of State.

- teaching and learning legal translation and court interpreting
- sworn translators and interpreters in legal proceedings
- mistranslations and misinterpreting in the legal context
- harmonisation and standardisation in translation and interpretation

TRAVEL INFORMATION

Białystok is the largest city in northeastern Poland and the capital of the Podlaskie voivodeship, situated about 200 kilometres from Warsaw. It has historically attracted migrants from elsewhere in Poland and beyond, particularly from Central and Eastern Europe. This is facilitated by the fact that the nearby border with Belarus is also the eastern border of the European Union as well as the Schengen Area. It is the gateway to many natural attractions of the Podlasie region, known collectively as the *Green Lungs of Poland*, including the Biebrza and Białowieża national parks. Białystok is also the place of birth of Ludwik Zamenhoff, the inventor of the artificial language, Esperanto.

HOW TO GET TO BIAŁYSTOK

There are several possibilities for getting from Warsaw to Białystok. The trip to Białystok should take about 3 hours.

BY PLANE

The closest Polish international airports are: Warsaw Chopin Airport and Warsaw Modlin Airport, both located in the heart of Poland, about 200 km away from Białystok.

BY BUS

Once you fly into Warsaw Chopin Airport or Warsaw Modlin Airport, you may take a direct express bus service that leaves for Białystok from either airport. The bus company is Podlasie Express (<http://www.podlasie-express.pl/index.php?lang=en>). The schedule for buses to Białystok may be found at the following address:

Buying bus tickets online in advance is highly recommended. The price of the bus ticket is about 50 PLN (ca. 12 euro). Podlasie Express operates high quality coaches equipped with air conditioning and free Wi-Fi access.

An alternative to air, train and car travel is a bus connection, PolskiBus.com, a good value inexpensive inter-city express coach service based in Poland, serving both national and international routes. The company serves over 20 cities across Poland and Central and Eastern Europe, - including 5 European locations: Berlin, Bratislava, Prague and Vienna. BY TRAIN

Another convenient way to get to Białystok is to take city bus no. 175 or train (SKM, WKD) from Warsaw Chopin Airport to Warsaw city centre (Central Warsaw) and then take a train to Białystok.

Payment in Polish currency (PLN) for a train ticket is required, but you could also use your credit card or buy a ticket by means of ticket vending machines. The price of the train ticket from Warsaw - Białystok is about 50 PLN (ca. 12 EUR). Please note that there are many ATMs and exchange offices at the railway stations.
